arguments by russett doyle and müller are given attention but to a greater or lesser extent they are flawed or insufficient at the same time this dissertation points out a number of special characteristics of democratic states of importance pulling those together an approach is proposed based on the assumption that the international system itself bears a major responsibility for the democratic peace supporting an approach by hasenclever it is argued that international institutions set up by democratic states are especially capable of mitigating conflicts and thus prevent war together with the special features of their member states such organisations account for the peaceful behaviour of democracies
